



# Galashiels Old Parish and St Paul's Church

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Dear Friends,

Religion is a frightening thing – we're seeing a lot of it just now on the news and it doesn't make happy viewing. Before you think I'm going to come round to defending it let me disabuse you right now, I agree, it is dangerous. We have seen the response around the world of Islamic societies to the cartoon's published in Denmark and then trawled across other European publications. We have seen the bombing of the shrine in Iraq; less well known but equally disturbing the terrorizing of Christian communities in a number of countries. Who would have thought that the 21st Century would start with religion being centre stage yet that is what has happened.

The Western world has been moving towards a more secular view of everything and has been caught off guard by the way religion far from dying has regained a new lease of life. Secularism seems to have missed the point about the importance of spiritual matters to most people as well as missing the results of trying to get rid of religious beliefs.

The University of Wales in the most extensive survey of its kind of 13-15 year-olds found that teenagers with no religious belief were much more likely to feel bad about themselves and their relationships with other people than those with faith. They were also uncommitted to their

relationship with the rest of the world, with 41 per cent unconcerned about world development issues. And, most interesting of all, *they tend to allow their lives to be ruled by irrational beliefs and superstitions* proving the old saying, that if you don't believe in God it's not that you believe nothing but that you'll believe anything. Trying to get rid of religion just gives rise to ?... *worse religion!*

The truth is the West's way of dealing with religious issues is not working and if there is to be any hope of getting out of this mess it will have to look at the spiritual again. In truth it has been trying a little but refusing to look at what has been the founding staple of its spiritual roots, Christianity. The mood is that whatever the solution, it can't be there.

What we are called to do in the Church is to pray and live in such a way that shows the light even if it will not be received. Interestingly half of teenagers who had no religion agreed that those in a faith community were much more likely to feel their life had a sense of purpose – so a message is getting through. To that has to be added that holding a religious conviction made them more likely to be bullied but then that has always been the way of the cross, hasn't it. Let's pray for light and for courage.

## Two important practical matters to do with the Church building:

**HEATING** Someone has interfered with the time switch for the boiler in the kitchen causing the boiler to operate ALL DAY EVERY DAY. The switch is programmed to suit times of most hall users and these are shown on the inside of the cupboard door. If heating is needed outwith the times shown it can be switched on by pressing the 1 hour button and heating will operate for an extra hour. If organisations are unhappy with the current timings or need extra time please contact Ian Forsyth. The boiler controls the heating in the passageway and the toilets as well as the hot water.

**FLOODLIGHTS** There have been signs of damage being done again to the floodlights, presumably with the aim of stealing them. If you happen to be passing the church at any time please just cast your eyes towards the building you might just spot someone acting suspiciously. Don't take action but report any suspicions to the police.

# NEVER ENDING GARDENS PROJECT

Hopefully by now I will have spoken to you about my experience in South Africa or maybe you came along to the presentation evening on Sunday 5th March. But I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to those who contributed and tell you a little more about this project.

The first place we visited to start planting gardens was Phumlani orphanage. There were 134 orphans living in basically 3 warehouse style buildings. One of the warehouses was for the boys, another was for the girls and the third was the kitchen / dining room. All these orphans were looked after by *one* lady named Esther Nkozi. Esther was helped by some other widowed mothers or mothers with learning difficulties. On visiting the orphanage, Esther told us that a local church had donated food the day before we arrived, if she had not received this donation, the children would not have anything to eat that day. This was a far cry from the benefit state we have over here in Scotland. Even in the midst of this, Esther had very strict rules for cleanliness and hygiene. She told us "You can be poor, but you can still be clean".



The next day we all went to Phumlani Church where we met the congregation of approximately 400 people, who did like to sing. The one thing that will always stick in my memory about this service was when the Sunday school did a short drama about getting raped. This was the something that we soon found out that children were taught from early age. It was explained to us that although Aids is responsible for killing of an entire generation in South Africa, there is still a lack of education and it is still widely believed by the men that they can be cured from Aids by having sex with a virgin, therefore very young children are being raped over in Africa.

The week continued with us working in different townships in the region of Mpumlanga where we asked people if they would like us to plant vegetable gardens for them, we then encouraged them to come out and work with us and showed them how to continue to look after the gardens. As well as planting the gardens we visited an Aids clinic and also met amazing people who were either missionaries or just people who were giving themselves to serve God's purpose in South Africa. At the end of the week I even sat down with the Police Commander in the area where we were planting the gardens.

## CARE

*Care is an organization known to some of our members which exists to promote Christian values in society by many different methods, including providing information about government legislation affecting family life and other areas. They rallied opposition to the recent Racial and Religious Hatred Bill which was recently debated in Parliament. Their latest Newsletter has some interesting comments about secularization some of which are reproduced below.*

“It is important that we continue to stand against the increasing tide of secularization in our society. Two of the most outspoken critics of what CARE is seeking to achieve are the British Humanist Association and the National Secular Society. Both these organizations are committed to seeing the removal of all traces of Britain’s Judaeo-Christian heritage from our statute books, school curricula, the BBC’s programme schedule and other national institutions... It seems that committed secularists are not content to reduce the impact of Christianity in our national life, but in fact wish to go one step further and even ridicule Christian truth... Have some of us been guilty of taking for granted our Judaeo-Christian heritage, and forgetting that Christian principles have formed the basic building blocks of our society? The first governors of the BBC modelled their vision for public broadcasting on Christian values. Each day’s Parliamentary business is opened with prayer. But in our post-modern society these precious traditions are in danger of being lost or eroded, which is why CARE was set up in the first place – to undertake Christian action, research and education, standing up for the truths of our faith and to demonstrating the compassion of Christ to the most vulnerable in our society.”

The Barnabas Fund is launching a campaign under this title calling for Christian minorities to receive just and equal treatment with non-Christian majorities. Over the next year, petitions will be circulated asking for signatures to support this campaign.

Some may ask "What is the Barnabas Fund" Information is available on their web site [www.barnabasfund.org](http://www.barnabasfund.org) but for many who do not have access to this, you might like to know that the Barnabas Fund provides practical aid for persecuted Christians in over 50 countries. Feeding programmes, children's schooling, small businesses to enable Christians to support their families, help for victims of violence, care of converts and their particular needs, leadership training, buildings, Bibles and Christian literature, support for Christian workers ministering in their own countries – these are just some of the ways in which Barnabas Fund seeks to transform the lives of Christians suffering for their faith.

It is hard for us to imagine what it can be like for Christians in some countries today. Many examples could be quoted but there is no space to do this – so one will suffice. In Indonesia, three Christian women have been imprisoned for allowing Muslim children to attend their after school Christian children's club. The children's Muslim grandmother had asked if they could attend. The wave of protests over the cartoons offensive to Muslims which were printed in a Danish newspaper has put Christians even more at risk of reprisals. When they turn to police and security forces for safety, protection, justice – they often find only further injustice. Please remember these brothers and sisters in your prayers – and do please sign the petition when it comes your way.
