A letter from our Locum Minister

Dear Members and Friends,

In these days when we are being encouraged to "think out of the box" and consider "blue sky ideas" one area of concern is far from new: "How can we get more young people into the church?" You can guarantee that the question will be asked every time groups of people gather to discuss the future of the church.

A friend of mine, a minister in another denomination, faced the challenge in his small town in England. He had established good contacts with the local secondary school and he asked the young people why they did not come to church. The conversation went something like this:

- "We don't understand all that 'these' and 'thous' language in church"
- "I speak the same way in church as I'm speaking to you now"
- "But the music is dreary and we don't like the sound of the organ"
- "In my church a band leads the music and most of the stuff we use has been written in my lifetime and a lot of it in your lifetime"
- "But we can't understand what vicar's [he's not a vicar] going on about"
- "Well I don't mind if someone interrupts to ask a question. Is there anything else?"

Silence.

- "So if you come to my church we'll have modern upbeat songs led by a good band; the words we use will be ordinary English not something churchy; if you don't understand or disagree with me you have my permission to interrupt. Will you give it a try?"
- "No"
- "Why not?"
- "Because we don't want to."

For my friend, and for me, that was a light bulb moment. We can set out to make church as undemanding, entertaining, interesting and accessible as is humanly possible, but if someone doesn't want to come to church they won't.

I honestly believe the church is greatly misguided in believing that it can perform some sort of entertaining trick and people will flock in.

So do I have anything positive to add to the discussion? Yes.

Firstly, we must make this a matter of prayer, both individually and together. To miss out on prayer can so easily look like we think that we can solve the problem without God if we're clever enough.

Secondly, we should cultivate relationships where we can reach a point of inviting someone to church with us. The current social climate wants religious belief to be kept strictly private and behind closed doors. We need to pray (again) and seek opportunities to invite people we know to come with us - and to keep on inviting them even if they decline the first time.

Thirdly, we need to rethink our strategy of trying to get children to bring their parents. We need to take a grown up message out to adults and they will, when convinced, make sure that their children come along.

You may disagree completely but, if you do, let's reason together. We are in this together and the kingdom is coming.

Foodbank

Thanks!

I am passing on thanks from the Galashiels Foodbank Committee to Old Parish and St Paul's for its support of the Foodbank for the past year.

During 2018, there have been volunteer changes in the role of Co-ordinator and also in the role of Treasurer, so it has been a challenge to the Foodbank Committee to keep the Foodbank operating. I can tell you that during 2017, there were in total 652 referrals to the Foodbank, with 1006 individuals receiving food during that year. As of the beginning of December 2018, referrals had jumped from 652 to 774 for the 11 months of the year. This is a sad sign of the times and a big jump in demand for the duty teams to deal with. Remember - while Galashiels has one of the biggest foodbanks in the Borders, it is only one of them!

We have received great support from Old Parish & St Paul's volunteers during this year, as a result of which I have had very few issues to face covering the days when we are on duty. If you would be interested in providing time to work with our duty team, please note that we are only on duty 3 days during every 8-week period, so the demands on your time would not be high. If you want to find out more information, speak to David Leckey for my contact details.

The Foodbank also appreciates donations at any time, and the Congregational Board agreed a new method of doing this at its meeting on January 15th: details below.

Albert Thomas (Bert) Hegarty

On Thursday 24th January family and friends, including a number from church, gathered to mark the passing from this life of Bert Hegarty on 13th January 2019.

Bert was 87 and had endured indifferent health for a number of years following a road traffic accident. He was an engineer to trade, and after National Service in the RAF he worked for GPO Telecommunications, latterly BT. He was a man of many interests but will be remembered with appreciation for his service to Old Parish and St Paul's. He was an elder who served as Presbytery Elder, in Sunday School and young people's work, on the Property Committee, and enjoyed meeting others in the Badminton Club.

We warmly welcome and extend the hand of fellowship to Craig Wetherby and Jade Smith, who took their vows of admission at the morning service on Sunday 20th January.

We've all become much more aware in recent years of just how much trade matters to our daily lives. We've become very aware of how many jobs, government policies, the goods we buy and services we enjoy are linked to trade – both here in the UK, and in countries right around the world.





We can think about trade in (at least) two ways.

First, trade is a way for everyone to have better lives. Without trade, we could not eat bananas, or drink coffee, for example. Without trade, many jobs would simply not exist. Trade is cooperation, and partnership that helps us all.

The second point about trade is that it is a tough business. Negotiations are hard fought. No-one wants to come out with a bad deal. To "arm wrestle" successfully in trade negotiations, you need big economic and political muscles.

So, when trading with poorer communities around the world, it is right to ask two questions. **First**, who's got the power? Or, if you like, who's got the biggest muscles?

Second, are those we trade with opponents and competitors – or friends and partners? This year the Fairtrade Foundation puts the spotlight on the Côte d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast), the world's biggest cocoa producer. Four million people across Cote d'Ivoire grow cocoa, much of which comes to the UK. And yet, shockingly, 60 percent of all cocoa farmers live below the United Nations poverty line of just £1.47 per day.

Who's got the power in this trading relationship? It isn't the farmers.


